KEYNOTE SPEAKER: MATTHEW J. BOWERMAN

Matthew J. Bowerman is an award-winning educator, researcher, and keynote speaker with nearly 30 years in K-16 education. A nationally published author and advocate for trauma-responsive teaching, he is committed to creating healing-centered learning environments. His work has been widely published in Edutopia, NEA, NAESP, AMLE, and Teach Better, and his book, *Heartleader: A Trauma Responsive Approach to Teaching, Leading, and Building Community*, has helped educators nationwide foster empathetic, student-centered classrooms. An Emmy and Cine Golden Eagle Award recipient, Matthew also wrote *BusSTOP*, a short film addressing the bullying crisis in the U.S.

Currently completing his doctorate at Bowie State University, his research explores the lived experiences of African American educators implementing trauma-responsive practices. As a keynote speaker and trainer with Calmer Schools and Teacher Goals, he equips educators with strategies in trauma-responsive teaching, neurodivergence, bullying prevention, and mindfulness. A former professional actor and father of six, Matthew draws from his neurodivergent, trauma-impacted background to champion student-centered education. His philosophy is simple: "It's all about authentic relationships. It's all about authentic love."
